Sisters and Brothers of Faith Church,

The license plates on my car reveal one of my interests: radio. The government granted me amateur radio license KG2HZ. I have "talked" with ham radio operators in fifty states and several foreign countries. I say "talk" because I like working in Morse code. Most people hear beeps and squeals. I hear letters and numbers when I am in good practice. I "talked" with hams in Spain and Ukraine by Morse code using only 5 watts of power (less power than the lightbulb in your refrigerator). I listen to broadcast radio in the car. The radio usually ends up on National Public Radio or Canadian Broadcasting. CBC aired one story that made me pause. The story segment with a speech a woman gave at her wedding twenty years ago. The announcer said the woman lost her ability to speak after she suffered a stroke. I have seen that too often with elders. I once saw a young woman (like the woman in the story) who had a stroke, but modern medicine reversed the stroke within minutes. The woman in the CBC story was not so fortunate. She had had to use an electronic board to talk with her husband. The process of "talking" was slow.

A different miracle of modern medicine happened for this woman. Surgeons placed a net of electrodes directly on her brain. Artificial intelligence now helps her talk through a computer. Sentences that used to take five minutes to process now take less than a minute. All she has to do is try to talk, and a computer completes what her body cannot do on its own.

I listened to the story and asked myself how our grandchildren and great-grandchildren will hear the stories of Jesus' miracles after such advancements. I used to see the ways we adapt to hearing loss (hearing aids and sign language) and poor eyesight (glasses and contact lenses) as ways the human spirit overcomes weaknesses and problems. God gave us abilities we use every day. We have entered an age when brain surgeons can help the speechless talk. A newspaper story recently told how computers helped a paralyzed man walk. Will a generation to come read the gospels and say "so what?" Will future generations lose the wonder I feel when I read the gospels because our Lord's miracles seem ordinary? Previous generations tried to explain everything from the parting of the Red Sea to how Jesus' fed the multitudes. Those explanations, no matter how well meaning, took away the amazement I believe God's love and care for us should create.

You might guess from what I have written that I do not take the Bible as "literally true." The scriptures are too important to read literally. We receive God's word to build our souls and our faith. We hear Jesus made a crippled man walk and healed a woman from years of bleeding. This is not material for the *Journal of the American Medical Association*. I read these stories and hear Jesus' great love for us–which is what my faith needs. Technology will develop more wonders for injured human bodies, but Jesus loves us into a life that has no end. No computer will love you or me that way.

Keep reading the Bible with a sense of wonder. No need to ask how Jesus did one miracle or another. Ask why–and let his love and compassion direct you each day.


